NEWS FROM THE DEANERY OCTOBER 2018

Autumn is now with us, and with it Harvest Festivals - the annual celebrations of all that God gives us, and the work of so many – farmers, gardeners, agricultural and horticultural workers. If we were near the coast, that list would also include those who work on the seas, and those who support them. But our celebrations also point us to managing and sharing, fairly and wisely, God's provision for us. What can we do to feed the hungry as Jesus did?

Help, we have no organist.................Saturday, October 13th Knowing that many of our churches struggle with making music, there will be a special Singing/Cantor Workshop for anyone involved in leading worship with limited musical resources on Saturday, October 13th at St. Edmunds, Shipston, between 2-5 pm.

'Lift up your voice', subtitled No instruments? Let's get singing! is music for your service without an organ or piano. Led by Miles Quick, RSCM Head of Congregational and Instrumental Music, it will explore traditional, Taize, Iona and worship songs, and ways of introducing music in to worship - for churches small & large, rural & urban, with or without choirs, singing groups or worship bands. Then we shall end with worship using some of the music learned.
