Also a team of volunteers had a working party in the school grounds, including improving the school vegetable garden for Gardening Club.

Many children were delighted to see that the Men's Gymnastics Team had won a gold medal at the Commonwealth Games in Australia. Team member, Dominick Cunningham, had visited school in the autumn, performed on the floor and apparatus, and really encouraged the children to get involved in sport. A recent visit by two cricket coaches from All Stars Cricket, also promoted sport. A fun assembly introduced some basic skills by getting the teachers to demonstrate! Four year groups each had an hour full of activities and games with an opportunity to join the All Stars programme.

Another month of different weather where we have had some glorious days with considerable warmth, some rainy ones and some very chilly ones. All of which meant a late blossoming of the apples but masses of the earlier beautiful pear blossom. The plum varieties were much earlier and it looks as though they managed to set some fruit and hold on to it. I look forward to the June drop when we really see just how much fruit has set on all the trees. We do sometimes get late frosts but hopefully this year we won't as there are some little apricots and peaches in evidence!

The bees are visiting the tree blossom as well as the many wild flowers that are in bloom. We also have lots of white honesty in the sensory garden which is proving popular along with the rosemary. The dandelions of course are always there and the mowers are battling them on a regular basis, we also have the bonus of scything around the trees to keep the grass from competing where the mower can't get in close.

All the orchard has had its spring boost of feed and the trees have been organically sprayed to help combat the aphids and bacteria as well as a foliar boost of seaweed. So far everything is looking strong and apart from a little powdery mildew pretty healthy!

Not so many raspberries this year but lots of other fruit for our members to enjoy. Why not come and help us and get some of the delicious harvest?

We are off the Shenington Road behind the allotments and are working, weather permitting, on Wednesday and Sunday mornings.
